Mayor Newhard: And so tonight we have a presentation from the Warwick Valley Community Center Youth Leadership Program. Henry, I am going to ask you to come up and speak to our Board.

1. Warwick Valley Community Center Youth Leadership Program

Henry Prevost spoke about the Warwick Valley Community Center Youth Leadership program and the variety of service-oriented projects that they are exposed to which help them develop their leadership skills. Henry opened the floor to approximately twenty members of the program. They introduced themselves to Board members and talked about how long they have been in the program, their accomplishments and opportunities the program afforded them. Kerry Demetroules presented an award from the County Executive. The award Kerry presented was for outstanding leadership, volunteerism and citizenship and this year they nominated Travis Stella, who won first place.

2. HeatSmart Warwick

Carolyn Cassata from Sustainable Warwick spoke about the HeatSmart program. HeartSmart is part of the wider state campaign through funding called the Clean Heating and Cooling Campaign. Carolyn spoke about the benefits of the HeatSmart program and savings it provides. Michael Helm, who was an early adopter of the technology also spoke about the benefits and savings the program provides. He also spoke about how it will reduce our carbon footprint. Six handouts about the program were provided to us which are displayed in Village Hall.

Discussion Prior to Vote:

Trustee Paterson: Just a question, why aren't we closing roads?

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Mayor Newhard: I guess it's...

Trustee Paterson: I mean we clearly have time, but...

Mayor Newhard: Yeah

Trustee Paterson: We need to have motions. They can't ask us to close the road, but we will close it as our suggestion for the benefit of the event. If we need to close South Street from Main to Third, Railroad Avenue...

Mayor Newhard: I don't know if we ever, we've always given motions and permission to use those areas, including the streets encompassing High Street, South Street, and parking lots so by its very nature...

Trustee Paterson: So, would this be one of those times where it's what we always done?

Mayor Newhard: Yeah, I didn't say that, you said it.

Trustee McManus: So, wouldn't the police normally close it off because of...

Trustee Paterson: Yeah.

Trustee McManus: Public safety and we will lead the motion to then close roads.

Trustee Paterson: Oh, well we close them for so many things I just assumed this would be one of them.

Trustee McManus: We could, I'm just saying they can close the road regardless of what we say.

Mayor Newhard: Well, I don't mind, it's belts and suspenders and I think it's ok. So, we could just go over, why don't we just do a roster of the roads. I mean it would be, South Street, Railroad Ave.

Trustee Paterson: That's it, South Street from Main Street to Third. Is it Third or is it ...

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Michael Moser: Yeah, they usually close up to Belmar or, we put a truck at Belmar, we go up Clinton or Belmar to get away from us.

Trustee Paterson: So, Third, what about Parkway? Is it Parkway?

Michael Moser: Yes,

Mayor Newhard: Parkway to Parklane is closed.

Michael Moser: Yes

Trustee Paterson: Ok, so I would like to make a motion to close Railroad Avenue, South Street from Main Street to Belmar...

Mike Moser: First Street.

Trustee McManus: First Street.

Trustee Paterson: First Street and its entirety.

Mike Moser: Second Street.

Trustee McManus: Second Street.

Trustee Paterson: Second street is closed?

Mike Moser: Coming in one way, the long way. Can't come in on the South Street side...

Trustee Paterson: Oh, ok. Second street, Third....

Trustee McManus: Third is closed obviously....

Mike Moser: Belmar up where it ties in is usually open.

Trustee Paterson: Right, so Third from Belmar to South...

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Mayor Newhard: Right.

Trustee Paterson: And Parkway from Parklane to South...

Mike Moser: Right.

Trustee Paterson: For the benefit of, I just remembered all the roads, for the Applefest.... the benefit of Applefest on Sunday, October 6, 2019 from 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. or earlier? 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Mike Moser: One of them said 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m. and the last one was 9:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m., so 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Mayor Newhard: 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m., I think it's 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Trustee Paterson: 6:00 a.m. to 6:00 p.m.

Mike Moser: Makes sense to me.

Trustee McManus: No, because people who come in set up in the parking lot so it can't be closed at 6:00 a.m.

Trustee Paterson: Well, they come in to set up the booths so....

Mike Moser: It's closed to traffic not closed to users.

Trustee McManus: It's not closed traffic until around like 8:00 a.m. when they tell all the vendors they have to abandon the parking lots.

DPW Supervisor's Report

Mike Moser: Ok, it's been awhile since you heard it, I'm sorry if you hear it again.

- All village owned properties were continuously maintained.
- The Stanley Park project is underway, the equipment removal has been completed, construction fence installed, the mounds of moldy mulch has been removed. Grating has started, we replaced the drainage line that was concreted into the footing of the old equipment. We installed drainage under the swing set to resolve that standing water issue. A tractor trailer full of equipment was delivered today. We met with David Getz (the Village Engineer) and the surveyor this morning to plan out the next couple steps we got to do.
- The order control unit was installed at the wastewater plant, is up and running. Any and all snow events were taken care of including the clearing of main street and other roads.

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- All Dig Safe 811 utility mark ups were performed. We built some table and chairs for the court room.
- Met with the historical society for the water and sewer services on Forrester Avenue at the church. Laying out the sewer connection now.
- Attended a fire hydrant involve course.
- Asphalt patching of potholes continues.
- Repaired the water leak on Forrester, that ditch still needs to be hot asphalt hopefully this week.
- Guys attended a Dig Safe 811 training course.
- One of the back flow preventors were installed in the little league field. Continuing the infiltration investigation working to resolve the high inflow issue.
- Assisted the library with the bird box project.
- Removed some dead trees from the parks, Homestead Village Drive, trimmed them on Spring Street and Wheeler.
- Installed crosswalk signs on West Street by Wheeler.
- I attended a code enforcement training in Monticello and Chester.
- The sweeper is out removing the winter debris from the streets.
- Submitted a preliminary budget for DPW to the treasurer.
- Helped the gardeners at Railroad Green.
- Hopefully the asphalt plant will be opening tomorrow, we can start using the hot stuff again.
- Still waiting on Orange and Rockland for the gas line at Homestead Village generator.
- House at 50 Orchard Street was demolished today.

Mayor Newhard: Ah, finally. Ok, and that will become our village beach front property. Get out your towels. Very good and Bill did you want to mention something about the playground equipment?

Mike Moser: Oh, I'm sorry....

Trustee Lindberg: Yeah, the playground equipment came up very abrupt, so....

Mike Moser: Not....

Trustee Paterson: What does that mean?

Mike Moser: The first set of equipment, the smaller stuff that was closer to the end of the park down by....

Trustee Paterson: The existing equipment?

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Mike Moser: Yeah, the first set that we took apart came apart relativity ok. The posts were relativity ruined because the cement was bound up. We have parts that could be retro-fitted to other things so that's there. The second set, the colossal big set that was closest to the bathrooms, we waited for tools and parts, we called the company, we tried everything we could. So, on the last-ditch effort we strategically cut pieces where maybe something could be salvaged. Underneath there was a little screen where a kid can put a head through, like a dinosaur and stuff like that, you know take a picture, that kind of stuff. We saved that, we saved some rounds, we saved anything that maybe someday you could think you'd want to use for something. But otherwise it was scrapped. It was, the platforms were ruined, and you couldn't, you know, no one feels comfortable and I'm sure that no insurance company will let you use it again, so unfortunately it got its full use, but it's gone.

Trustee Paterson: There's no saving money...

Mike Moser: And I know Trustee Lindberg wanted me to break the news to you because he sent me an email today and I forgot to mention it.

Trustee Paterson: I'm not at all surprised to hear that honestly, I hope the firetruck....

Mike Moser: We tried everything, the guys were there for days, and we tried every tool, we went everywhere we could, they tried, there were special torque screws and they had a safety pin, you know like a safety magnet and even the ones they sent us slipped off them. We couldn't catch a break.

Trustee Paterson: So, the firetruck is ok?

Mike Moser: The firetruck is ok, the rock wall, everything that was going back in the originally first pieces we took out are still

Mayor Newhard: The metal slide?

Mike Moser: Yeah, all still fine...

Trustee Paterson: Those were the only ones I expected to really survive.

Mike Moser: And still onsite, everything else we took offsite so that decisions can be made later, whatever happens.

Mayor Newhard: When I saw you actually pull out some of those posts with the large masses of cement that surrounded them, I was like, oh forget this.

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Mike Moser: That's why that one drainage pipe we had was replaced. It was cemented right into the concrete pipe that went underneath the park so when we...it was a learning experience.

Mayor Newhard: Yeah, well. You did...And the....

Mike Moser: The pool

Mayor Newhard: The pool,

Trustee Lindberg: I thought it was much bigger than that?

Trustee Paterson: You were much smaller.

Mayor Newhard: I thought it was much smaller. So...

Trustee Paterson: And was that still there? You didn't take it out?

Mike Moser: We didn't take it out yet, we were with Mr. Schmick this morning about the surveying of it. We have to lay out 300, 600, 300 holes that we plotted throughout that park. So, we're going to decide. I'd rather leave it as a base than, because I'm afraid if we pull it out it's four inches or at least four inches - six inches of concreate. Filling that hole and what's underneath it...

Trustee Paterson: We have three weeks before the build week starts so it seems bad timing to be making a major change like that. Structural change protentional to the foundation of the....

Mike Moser: From our meeting today, I think we are almost to grade. There are a couple spots we got to bring down. We made it temporary driveway to get the pod that's coming and some other things in and out. That will have to be removed before any of the equipment can be built. But as of now, I'm sure, everything that is the way it is. We're going to build up from there and level out to where the existing ground is up by South Street itself.so it won't really be you know, one of these going into the park and one of these going into the equipment. It should kind of be a, we're hoping for a one percent slope.

Trustee Paterson: Great.

Trustee Lindberg: They've done a pretty good job.

Mayor Newhard: Final comments from the floor?

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Trustee Lindberg: I just have one comment. My biannual comment about the park and with baseball. The speed limit in Memorial Park is 15 mph and now we have some speed bumps to help control some of the speed. But I want to add to that, the speed limit in the village in Warwick is 25 mph unless it's marked. And in the school Park Ave is 20 mph, so I would just encourage people to think about the safety of pedestrians and themselves and go 25 mph on village streets and also, it's very important to stop at stop signs. And it's very important to stop at a red light. And as people are hurrying these days more and more, I see less and less of that. So, 25 mph, right on red after you stop, stop signs - stop, red lights - stop. Too many people, no left out of here, so um....

Trustee Paterson: And also, important to note that going from here to High Street is not straight it's still left.

Mayor Newhard: It's still left, yeah.

Trustee Paterson: I'm sorry to Church, it's still a left and then a right.

Trustee Cheney: You're only allowed to make a right turn out of Wheeler onto Main.

Trustee McManus: It's also very important to stop for stopped school buses.

Trustee Paterson: Oh right

Trustee McManus: Gets past every day,

Trustee Paterson: Really?

Trustee McManus: Every day.

Mayor Newhard: That is terrible.

Trustee Lindberg: So, just a reminder.

Mayor Newhard: Thank you, a good reminder.

Mayor Newhard: Well thank you ladies and gentlemen. Can I have a motion to close the board meeting?
